General Licensing How Do CC Licenses Operate?

CC licenses are operative only when applied to material in which a <u>copyright</u> exists, and even then only when a particular use would otherwise not be permitted by copyright. Note that the latest version of CC licenses also applies to rights similar to copyright, such as <u>neighboring</u> <u>rights</u> and <u>sui generis database rights</u>. Learn more about the scope of the licenses. This means that CC license terms and conditions are not triggered by <u>uses permitted under any applicable</u> <u>exceptions and limitations to copyright</u>, nor do license terms and conditions apply to elements of a licensed work that are in the public domain. This also means that CC licenses do not contractually impose restrictions on uses of a work where there is no underlying copyright. This feature (and others) <u>distinguish CC licenses from some other open licenses</u> like the <u>ODbL</u> and <u>ODC-BY</u>, both of which are intended to <u>impose contractual conditions and</u> <u>restrictions</u> on the reuse of databases in jurisdictions where there is no underlying copyright or sui generis database right.

All CC licenses are non-exclusive: <u>creators and owners can enter into additional, different</u> <u>licensing arrangements</u> for the same material at any time (often referred to as "dual-licensing" or "multi-licensing"). However, <u>CC licenses are not revocable</u> once granted unless there has been a breach, and even then the license is terminated only for the breaching licensee.
